### **History of the South Big Horn Conservation District**

Following the Dust Bowl in the 1930s, the need to conserve natural resources became an important focus in the United States, leading to the 1935 formation of the Soil Conservation Service, now known as the Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS). To coordinate the conservation efforts of the NRCS and other agencies on a local level, conservation districts were formed nationwide by state governments. In March of 1941, Wyoming Legislature passed an act establishing conservation districts in the state. There are now 34 conservation districts in the State of Wyoming.


Big Horn County is home to two Conservation Districts: South Big Horn (covering Shell, Greybull, Basin, Emblem, Otto, Burlington, Manderson, Hyattville) and Shoshone Conservation District (covering Lovell, Byron, Frannie, Deaver, Cowley).


The Greybull Valley Conservation District was formed in 1945 following the devastating days of the "Dust Bowl." The South Big Horn & Shell Valley Conservation Districts were organized in 1947. In 1968, the Greybull Valley & Shell Valley Conservation Districts combined and became the Greybull-Shell Conservation District. In 1977, the South Big Horn and Greybull-Shell Conservation Districts decided to merge and at that time became known as the South Big Horn Conservation District.




